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
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
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WILLIAM E JOHNSON (Bill, Billy, Wink or Winky) 2/14/51 - 1/7/23

Bill worked as a security guard in Reno for a few months before accepting an offer to manage Truckee North Tahoe Materials, a concrete plant in Truckee, CA. During that time he invented the Aku-counter, a digital drum counter for concrete trucks. Bill sold and distributed the Aku-counter for several years all over the country. After seven years in California it was time to go back home to Eastern Washington.

Bill and Janet bought the Dinner Bell Restaurant and Lounge in Loon Lake, WA which they owned and operated for twenty years until it burned down in 2011. In 1996 Bill and Janet built the Lakeside Motel in Loon Lake, WA. As if running a restaurant and Motel wasn't enough, Bill started a construction company, and worked with his son-in-law Jesse Smith for many years. Bill's life came full circle in 2012 when he and Janet bought the Corner Cafe in Creston, WA. After purchasing the Corner Cafe they built storage units on the other side of town.
